- Scottish Declaration on Open Access (pre-dates Berlin 3) Since Berlin 3:
- CNRS (France, Centre national de la recherche scientifique) signs the Registry of Institutional OA Self-Archiving Policies to register its commitment to implementing the Berlin Declaration in its institutional repository, HAL, on 17 March 2005.
- Finnish Ministry of Education recommends OA for Finish research on March 18 2005.
- INRIA (the French National Institute for Research in Computer Science and Control) signs the Registry of Institutional OA Self-Archiving Policies to register its commitment to implementing the Berlin Declaration on 30 March 2005.

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
